A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT



Hello Junior League of Philadelphia Membership! Welcome to the 2021-2022 League Year! I'm so honored to be your President, and I am grateful for your trust in me to serve. I'm a native of the Philadelphia area and love to be an advocate for our region. I will strive throughout the course of this year to do my very best for all of you and for our organization, and if we have not yet met, I look forward to meeting you this year! It is surreal to be composing this letter at a time when we all hoped COVID-19 would be long behind us, but instead we are planning for a hybrid operational year. Even so, I know we will all work to our highest abilities in serving our community and enriching our membership. I'm so thankful to all of you for choosing to be

members of our organization as we continue to navigate the COVID-19 pandemic, and for the incredible efforts of Aronté Bennett and her leadership last year to ensure that we continued our mission work to varying comfort levels, exceeded fundraising goals, and demonstrated the strength and power of our membership in action. That we achieved all these accomplishments operating primarily in a virtual world is a testament to all of you and what we can accomplish together. I'd also be remiss if I did not express my gratitude for our wonderful staff, and all that they do for our League. To Debbie, Ruth, Suzanne, Crystal, Edna, and all our Part-Time Thrift Shop Staff, thank you!

As we begin this new League year, I have two goals that I am excited to share with you. The first is that all members, whether New, Active, or Sustainer, feel that they have a home in our League. This goal stems from my decade plus of JLP membership and knowing that we have work to do in helping all our members feel that they are welcome and valued. I plan to put this into action through trainings over the course of the year, speakers at our General Membership Meetings, and forging and deepening connections in our membership. It's incredibly important to me that no matter who you are, what you do, and where you are from, if you are a woman who wants to be a member, there's a home in our League for you. This aim will also help us continue our important work in Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging (DEI&B), and build on the achievements we've made in the past few years in elevating this committee to active from an ad-hoc, adding the Chairs to the Board and Management Council respectively, and conducting conversations to increase understanding and belonging.

The second is to increase our advocacy as a League. This aim arrives in the form of a desire to revive past advocacy work undertaken by the JLP, and to continue on the path of creating a formal process for review of our mission focus and undertaking the effort of reviewing and recommending how the JLP can be most effective in its community work that began two years ago. Additionally, ensuring our members receive trainings geared toward professional and personal advocacy in their lives in and out of the JLP is a part of this goal. On the mission facet, we have two Ad-Hoc Committees this year to explore Advocacy efforts that the League might undertake on behalf of our community partners and the work we do with them, and also to review our Issue-Based Community Impact (IBCI) of Apple A Day, and determine how we might continue with, evolve, or move to a new IBCI in the next few years. Through the training lens, we will hold events to increase advocacy for self and others through achieving professional goals, nominating for League leadership and placements to help members achieve their JLP goals.

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Concurrently, we must continue to be nimble in our operations as we operate in the pandemic and the challenges it brings while recognizing that we are still able to do a tremendous amount of great work (just look to the State of the League presented at the close of the 2020-2021 JLP Year!). We will work to operate as much as we can in-person, given current regulations, while offering virtual options to ensure that all our members feel comfortable, valued, and supported in participating to their comfort levels. We will be

mindful of the health and safety of our colleagues and community members. This is going to be another unusual year, but it is so incredibly important to focus on what we can do, not what we cannot do.

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, U.S. charitable giving for the twelve (12) months ended March 2021 increased by 3.4 percent over the prior year. (https://institute.blackbaud.com/ the-blackbaud-institute-index/) Likewise, donors like you contributed \$33,348.00 to the 2019-2020 JLP Annual Fund, a close-to 10 percent increase over the prior year. As we reflect on how to allocate resources in another challenging year, we are reminded of a story we once heard about generosity: an

As women of the JLP, we have already committed ourselves to sharing our time, talents, and resources for the betterment of our community. But the League itself also needs our support through an Annual Fund donation so that it can continue to be a vehicle through which we serve the community. The JLP Annual Fund is an unrestricted fund that primarily supports the JLP's operations and can be used for any line item in our budget, including supplies, subsidizing member development, and utilities, for example.

If you have not yet donated in the 2021-2022 League Year, there's still time left in 2021 to make a gift that may be eligible for a tax deduction. Or make it a New League Year's resolution to join the ranks of companies (yep, we'll accept corporate matches), JLP members, and friends giving to the Annual Fund in 2021-2022. No amount is too small. In addition to strengthening the League's presence, you may be joining a wave of charitable givers in 2021-2022; 2021 charitable donations have been predicted to increase by 5.1 percent over 2020. DIAD

DIAD kicked off fall with our annual Fall Service Weekend on October 1st - October 3rd! This year we partnered with Cathedral Kitchen, Face to Face and the Food Trust.

On Friday, October 1, 2021, a group of approximately (10) ladies met at headquarters for a sandwich making social. The ladies enjoyed our first in person social and community event this year. Together they prepped over 250 whole wheat turkey and cheese, and bologna and cheese sandwiches!! The sandwiches were delivered Saturday morning to Cathedral Kitchen in Camden, NJ, who is the largest emergency food provider in Camden, NJ, serving more than 100,000 meals a year! The sandwiches were distributed to the local homeless population.

On Sunday, October 3, 2021, DIAD hosted (2) events. Ladies joined the Food Trust at Headhouse Farmers' Market in Society Hill. The Food Trust hosts various farmers' markets throughout Philadelphia, which helps make fruits and vegetables more affordable and accessible to everyone. Usually we assist with processing EBT payments, distributing Food Bucks and setting up and breaking down the market. But this time we were tasked with helping a local farmer from West Chester, whose home and farm were recently destroyed by a fire. The local farmer was extremely appreciative of the Junior League assisting him sell the salvaged produce from the farm. The ladies had a great time managing the stand with him and helping the Food Trust in their efforts to support the farm.







Another group of ladies volunteered at Face to Face, who support struggling families, individuals and the homeless in Germantown by providing a dining room, a nurse managed Health Center, a Legal Center, a Social Services Center, child educational programs and a washeteria where people can take a hot shower and receive a new set of clothes. The ladies assisted the dining room by spending the day in the kitchen. Tasks included peeling/ chopping kale, apples, mushrooms, butternut squash, chicken, and making various marinades. The ladies had a successful day and prepped 200 Sunday meals!

Fall service weekend was a great success this year and the ladies enjoyed getting back out in person to help support our community partners in our aligned missions to build a healthier and happier Philadelphia community by FEEDing families!

- 1. Open your LinkedIn profile.
- 2. If you have the Volunteer experience section already added to your profile, simply scroll to it and click the pencil (edit) icon to enter into edit mode, then go to Step 5.
- 3. If you don't have the Volunteer experience section added to your profile yet, add it by scrolling below the Contact Information at the top part of your profile. When

you scroll an "Add section" button will appear in the upper right-hand corner. In the drop down, menu under Background you will find Volunteer experience.

- 4. Click Volunteer experience and the Add volunteer experience form will appear.
- 5. In the Organization field enter "The Junior League of Philadelphia" and it will auto fill with our logo. In the Role field, enter your current role in the League (Vice President of Community, Done in a Day Committee, Member, etc.)
- 6. The Cause field can be left blank.
- 7. Check the "Currently volunteering in this role" box and then fill in the date you joined the JLP.
- 8. In the Description section, please include a JLP overview along with your experience. A sample is below for your reference. The

The JLP Garden Club has continued to provide a diverse range of online programming to its members via Zoom. In September, Jeff Groff, the Estate Historian at Winterthur Museum, presented a history of the Main Line estates of the industrialists, financiers, and manufacturers, providing an

intimate portrait of the families behind these monumental properties. In October, we heard from Doug Tallamy, Professor and Chair of the Department of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology at the University of Delaware in Newark and learned how the decisions that we make in our landscape designs

and plant choices can help support native species, stem the tide of wildlife decline (especially in our insect and bird populations), and sustain a healthy environment. Dr. Tallamy has initiated a grassroots movement called the "Homegrown National Park" (homegrownnationalpark.org), which seeks to regenerate biodiversity by encouraging homeowners to incorporate native plants into their gardens.

Although these online presentations and discussions have been a great way for the Garden Club to keep its momentum, we are delighted to have our first in person event on the calendar. On November 8th, we visited Longwood Gardens for a behind-thescenes tour of the Chrysanthemum Festival, featuring more than 70 large scale topiary forms.
